Authentic adventure across the High Arctic





Few voyages capture the imagination quite like the Northwest Passage. Spanning almost 1,700 nautical miles from Canada's Baffin Island in the east, to Alaska's Beaufort Sea in the west, traversing this isolated and wild sea route is an adventure like no other.

It's only possible to sail the Northwest Passage during the brief summer of just a few weeks when the ice conditions become more favourable. Hurtigruten's nautical expertise in extreme polar waters means we're one of the few companies to offer crossing attempts.

A historic tale of ice and water

A marine route through the Canadian Arctic Archipelago had long been suspected and attempts to chart it began in earnest in the 16th century. At the time sailors believed seawater couldn't freeze and thought a route might exist close to the North Pole. This conviction persisted for several centuries and led to numerous Arctic expeditions, many of which ended in disaster.

Don't do it Franklin!

Probably the most infamous attempt at the Northwest Passage was led by the intrepid British sea captain Sir John Franklin. His two ships, HMS Erebus and HMS Terror, with a combined crew of 129, set out in 1845 to chart the passage. The ill-fated mission descended into disaster when they became icebound for over a year. None of the crew ever returned, thought to have perished to hypothermia, starvation, and disease.

Six men in a boat

It took five centuries for navigators to finally chart a safe route through the Northwest Passage. Norwegian adventurer Roald Amundsen sailed the route in 1906, triumphantly doing so in his remodelled fishing boat Gjoa, with a crew of just six men. A key to the success of his three-year odyssey was to learn survival techniques from the local Inuit people, skills which would later prove invaluable in his quest to reach the South Pole.

Spectacular landscapes

Cruising through the passage, we'll see an ever-changing maze of water channels between vast pristine panoramas. From breathtaking vistas of ice-clad mountains rising above the tundra, to seascapes of blue water afloat with delicately hued icebergs, you'll see it all from the comfortable vantage point of the ship.

Magical Arctic wildlife

Polar bears hunting on the ice, an arctic fox venturing across the tundra, beluga whales breaking the surface of the waters; these are just some of the magnificent animals you might see on the voyage. Our wildlife experts will help you seek out the best sightings, and you can learn more from our extensive onboard programme of lectures and our Science Center.

Respecting Mother Nature

We love the Arctic, but we know nature is the boss and our plans sometimes have to adapt. Occasionally, we'll have to find alternative routes that don't feature on the daily itinerary, or even turn back. If we're forced to do so, we'll simply head off on a different – alternative – adventure. That's why it's called an attempt, and it's this unpredictability which makes it an expedition, not just a cruise.

Northwest Passage

August & September 2024

Gjoa Haven

Named in 1903 by Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen, here you'll join an informative walking tour and visit two centres dedicated to the history and culture of the area.

Ulukhaktok

This remote village has 500 people who earn their livelihood hunting, trapping and fishing.

Cambridge Bay

The Inuinnaqtun name for Cambridge Bay is 'Iqaluktuuttiaq'. It means 'Good Fishing Place', thus named due to the bountiful Arctic char in the Ekalluk River. Musk oxen and caribou roam here.

Smoking Hills

Named by explorer John Franklin, the smoke here is caused by sulphur-rich lignite – brown coal – that's been exposed to oxygen as the hills erode.

Although Sir John Franklin was the first European to see and name the island, Indigenous peoples had already been living here for thousands of years and called this place 'Qikiqtaruk', which simply means 'island'.

Animals of the High Arctic


The Northwest Passage is an unspoiled oasis across the High Arctic. Its animal life of musk oxen, caribou, seals and polar bears migrate to more comfortable climes or adapt to the icy landscape.

Mammals on ice

The waters of the Northwest Passage are home to six species of seal: harp, hooded, ringed, bearded, spotted, and ribbon. Closely related to the seal, the mighty walrus also lives there, and you can identify them from afar by their big hairless bodies and long ivory tusks.

The natural predators of ringed and bearded seals, polar bears are endemic to the North Pole. With its pale fur and a standing height of up





Herbivore herds

Deep in the tundra live herds of musk oxen and caribou. A caribou is noticeable for its majestic antlers, which stretch out above its head on both sides like tree branches. You may notice a musk ox's shaggy coat, but it's the strong odour that the males emit during mating season which has inspired the ox's name.





A warm invisibility cloak – Beneath their distinctive white coat, the skin of polar bears is actually jet black, helping it retain sunlight it absorbs through its hair. Their fur doesn't even contain any white pigment but is instead made up of hollow hairs that scatter visible light, keeping them camouflaged against the sea ice. A dense layer of underfur and a further layer of blubber insulates the body, keeping the polar bear warm.



Regenerative antlers – What sets caribou apart from others in the deer family is that both males and females grow antlers. In the early stages of development, they're covered in a layer of soft fuzz, called velvet, which provides nutrients to the antlers and promotes growth. Once they have finished growing, the caribou sheds the velvet, exposing sharp, red stained antlers. Shortly after this, the antlers themselves fall off, and regrow over the next year.



Toothy tools – The scientific name for a walrus is Odobenus rosmarus, which is Latin for "tooth-walking seahorse". This is appropriate as their iconic tusks are actually canine teeth, and have been known to grow up to 37 inches! Males have bigger tusks than females, and the tusks never stop growing throughout their lives. They can be used as tools to help a walrus haul itself onto ice floes, or as weapons to help males defend their territory.



The epic Northwest Passage is worthy of any bucket-list, where only an intrepid few have sailed or set foot. With sea ice and weather conditions hopefully in our favour, this famously challenging sea route is potentially navigable for a just a few weeks of the year.

We'll attempt to cross the High Arctic, exploring the islands that dot this ice-strewn sea route. You might find yourself visiting pre-historic Inuit dwelling sites together with an archaeologist or spotting pods of narwhal with a specialist in wildlife.



Landings

As wind, waves and sea ice allow, our Expedition Team experts will escort you safely ashore for a variety of highlights: Visit Beechey Island where you can pay your respects to the fallen maritime explorers of 1845's ill-fated Franklin Expedition; arrive at Ulukhaktok, a hamlet rich in arts and crafts; or stop at Gjoa Haven, 'the finest little harbour in the world.'

Hiking*

Our experienced guides will take the lead on optional hikes to areas of natural beauty. In Greenland, try the long hike through Paradise Valley and around Mt. Lille Malene. Or for the very fit climber, Isimiut's Palaasip Qaqqa mountain path is well worth the scenery at the top. At Red Bay in Labrador, Canada, a hike up Tracey Hill will reward you with a fantastic view.



Expedition boat cruising

Although your expedition ship is small, there are limits on where it can go due to its size. This is where our small expedition boats come into their own. Launching from the tender pit of the ship, these expedition boats are small and agile, letting you experience this pristine wilderness up close.



Kayaking*

The kayak or 'man's boat' originated in the Arctic region. Channel the Inuit kayakers of centuries past as you glide silently through still Arctic waters, icebergs and glaciers towering in the distance.

Lectures

With each exciting new discovery come questions, many of which will be answered at our informative onboard lectures. Topics range from tectonic activity, glaciology and local history, to culture, wildlife and photography. The knowledgeable Expedition Team aim to enhance your appreciation for your surroundings and inform your upcoming landings.



Aun

Science Center

The ship's Science Center is a hub for information and education. You'll have access to scientific equipment such as advanced geological microscopes, as well as an extensive library. Learn about the wildlife and ecosystems of the Arctic or be a part of live scientific research with a Citizen Science programme.



Wildlife watching

Some 60% of the world's polar bears live in the Canadian Arctic – increasing your chances of spotting this impressive apex predator. Look out for the majestic whales of the Arctic: minke, bowhead and beluga. At Pond Inlet, try to spot narwhal, which many believe inspired the legend of the mythological unicorn.

Add caribou and Arctic foxes to your list of wildlife to look out for. Avid birdwatchers might see the kittiwakes and auklets of the Bering Strait to the gulls and guillemots of Prince Christian Sound. We are also always on the lookout for the elusive Ivory Gull and other species unique to the Arctic.



From Iceland to Southern Greenland

From Reykjavík, you'll sail the Denmark Strait to Prince Christian Sound, a spectacular maze of channels made of granite rock and filled with ice floes and glaciers. We spend two days exploring the remarkable fjords and settlements of southern Greenland including the capital, Nuuk.

In addition to our experts on biology and wildlife, your Expedition Team will also be made up of a professional photographer, an archaeologist, and one or more Inuit cultural interpreters.

Into the Northwest Passage

The next part of our adventure takes us across the Davis Strait and the start of our attempt to transit the Northwest Passage. Over twelve days, we'll explore the

islands that dot this famously challenging sea route. You'll discover a range of possible sites amidst the spectacular scenery, abundant wildlife and Inuit settlements.

Our route and landings will depend on the sea and weather conditions, though we plan to go on small expedition boat cruising among ice floes to seek the Arctic wildlife. We'll then traverse the last section of the Northwest Passage towards the Pacific Ocean, heading west through the Amundsen Gulf, Beaufort Sea, Chukchi Sea and Bering Strait.

Should sea ice prevent us from completing the entire transit, you'll still have experienced the rugged beauty of the High Arctic and many chances to spot rare wildlife such as polar bears. Your expedition's end point is the lively city of Vancouver.

From the heart of the Northwest Passage

We start off exploring lively Montréal before flying to Cambridge Bay, where our sea expedition into the Northwest Passage begins. Over the next seven days, we'll explore the islands that dot this notoriously challenging territory, navigable for only a few weeks of the year. Exactly what we'll see and do depends on the sea ice and weather conditions.

As we sail, you'll pass spectacular ice cliffs sculpted by the elements. We'll pick locations for small expedition boat cruising with the Expedition Team where possible, which may include Gjoa Haven, Fort Ross, Beechey Island, Radstock Bay, Dundas Harbour and Pond Inlet.

Greenland: the world's largest island

If all goes to plan, we'll exit the Northwest Passage and cross Baffin Bay towards Greenland, You'll spend four days discovering its nature, history and wildlife, including stunning UNESCO-listed Ilulissat Icefjord and the capital, Nuuk, We continue towards Newfoundland and Labrador, where you'll visit a UNESCO-listed former whaling station in Red Bay and the charming city of Corner Brook. Our expedition ends in the city of Boston. Massachusetts, the heart of New England.

Even if a full transit of the Northwest Passage isn't possible due to sea ice, you'll still experience the raw and remote beauty of the High Arctic and enjoy many chances to look for rare wildlife such as the mighty polar bear.



Alaska is a destination for true explorers. With immense glaciers, deep fjords and vast stretches of wilderness, its scenery alone never fails to impress visitors. You'll also see remains of the gold rush era in the fishing villages, abandoned towns and bustling harbour towns you visit.

The waters of Alaska are teeming with life. You might see whales, porpoises, dolphins or even large colonies of sea lions. On land, look out for moose and caribou wandering the forests and

brown bears fishing for salmon in the rivers. Birders can look forward to spotting some of the many rare species that call Alaska their home.

A long history

Alaska is also a great place for history buffs. The history of the area is well-documented by its artefacts. And the people who live here are proud of their collective heritage and are more than willing to share it with you.

People have inhabited the Aleutian Islands, other

islands in the Bering Sea and parts of western Alaska since the Second Ice Age. These communities share a common heritage and reliance on the North Pacific Ocean and Bering Sea, but each holds its own unique traditions. Inside Passage Alaska is home to the Tlingit, Haida and Tsimshian people, whose history is reflected in towering totem poles. Alaska has a more concentrated indigenous population than any other state, at more than 14 percent.



Russian settlers left a legacy of onion-domed churches gleaming with icons. In 1867, Russia agreed to sell Alaska to the United States for \$7.2 million. This amounted to about two cents an acre.

Bear country

Alaska really is bear country and all species of North American bears flourish here: grizzly, brown and black bears. In the north, polar bears roam. The brown bear is common in the coastal areas - in the interior they are called grizzly

bears. They are very large and can weigh from 350 to over 500 kilos. Black bears are abundant - an estimated 100,000 inhabit Alaska.

Alaska is the largest state in the United States in terms of area, but the population is only just over 700,000. If Manhattan had the same population density as Alaska, only 28 people would inhabit the island.

An adventure to remember

It wouldn't be a true adventure if it was completely predictable. Your safety is

of utmost importance to us, so the captain and Expedition Team will continuously assess the weather and ice conditions at sea to see which landings are safe to make.

For example, when visiting Katmai National Park, we'll choose between visiting Kinak Bay, Kunak Bay and Geographic Harbour, perhaps visiting two or even all three if time and weather permits. Whatever places you are able to visit, we can definitely guarantee you the adventure of a lifetime.

Alaska

May - September 2024

Nome

Nome rose to Alaskan fame with the discovery of gold in the town in 1898. You can still see evidence of the Gold Rush era everywhere, including abandoned dredges and old railroad tracks.

St Matthew Island

Many pioneers have attempted to settle on this island over the centuries, but it remains uninhabited. Only seabirds and the occasional fox roam its unspoilt, black sand beaches.

Katmai National Park

This otherworldly landscape was forged in 1912 by the largest volcanic eruption of the 20th century. Whales, fur seals, rare seabirds and over 2,000 protected brown bears make this four-million-acre wilderness their home.

Dutch Harbor / Unalaska

This thriving fishing port has rich culture and history. Explore the Museum of the Aleutians, and see the concrete bunkers and old gun batteries of the Aleutian World War II National Historic Area.

Bering

Unga Village

Experience the eerie beauty of this abandoned Aleut settlement. A collection of deserted wooden buildings lies surrounded by a carpet of pink louseworts and fireweed as nature reclaims the land.

Kodiak is a bustling fishing port surrounded by spruce forests and grassland. Here you'll find the Alutiiq Museum and the Kodiak History Museum, featuring artifacts from the island's Russian and Alutiiq past.

Amazing wildlife in an awe-inspiring setting

With towering mountain ranges, deep fjords and vast forests, Alaska has a diverse landscape that caters to an impressive variety of creatures.

Living waters

The cold waters of Alaska are home to seven whale species, along with the largest dolphin species, the orca. Keep an eye on the sea to catch sight of one of these aquatic giants surfacing. Closer to the coast, look out for sea otters floating in the shallows of Alaska's fjords. Join the locals down at the river to watch the salmon run; many look forward to this







A deceptive name – Despite being commonly known as "killer whales", taxonomists classify the orca as part of the dolphin species. Orcas have been known to prey on some whale species, which inspired whalers to give them the title "killer of whales". This morphed into "killer whales" over time, causing these striking black and white marine predators to be ironically mistaken for their own prey.



An unexpected home – Dry land is the typical home for mammals with legs, so the sea otter's habitat surprises many. With webbed feet, waterproof fur and excellent eyesight, they are well adapted to live exclusively in water, and are most often seen floating on their backs on the sea surface. Sea otters eat, sleep and even give birth in the water, and they have to keep their fur meticulously clean so it can stay water-resistant.



Seasonal fashionistas - The Arctic fox is often pictured with its distinctive coat of long, white fur, which serves as a convincing camouflage in a winter scene. However, with less frequent snow in the warmer months, white fur would make them dangerously obvious to their predators, so every spring these foxes undergo a fascinating transformation. They shed their winter coat in favour of a shorter coat of brown or grey fur to match the rocks and plants of the summer tundra.

annual event, including bears and bald eagles looking for a free meal.

Bustling land

Alaska is home to more than 70% of North America's brown bears. Even more common is the black bear, which, despite its name, is not always black. Three species of deer roam the forests of Alaska, feeding on the vegetation found within. Look closely to see bald eagles nesting in the trees and hummingbirds hovering around the flowers. In the tundra, try to see past the camouflage of the spritely Arctic fox.




From towering mountains and cavernous fjords to vast forestland and miles of coast, the largest state of the US is full of natural wonders that fill all who come here with awe.

Our landings and activities help you connect with the places you'll see. Town tours and visits to UNESCO World Heritage sites will enlighten you on the history and culture of the Alaskan people. For wildlife lovers, birds, whales, and bear safaris and walks in national parks will be the highlight.



Kayaking*

Glide through the water in silence and get close to the majestic nature of Alaska. Paddle ocean passages, iceberg lagoons or the calm waters of Alaska's coastal areas with an experienced guide.





Expedition Boat Cruising

Although your expedition ship is small, there are limits on where it can go due to its size. This is where our small Zodiac boats come in. Enjoy gliding through the water as you take in the stunning views of such places as College Fjord and Katmai National Park.



Landings

Whenever weather and sea conditions allow, we'll attempt landings via small Zodiac boat. Places might include the likes of picturesque Geographic Harbor or Kukak Bay, a place perfect for bear spotting. Once ashore, the Expedition Team will guide you on where to go and what there is to see, and ensure you stay safe at all times.



Photo programme

This included programme is designed for photographers of any ability, giving you tips that will help you better capture the spectacular photo opportunities in Alaska. You may also have a chance to join a more intensive one to two-hour Photo Adventures* session.



Shore excursions*

Optional excursions offer special experiences that bring you a step closer to the places we visit. These range from wildlife safaris, fishing, visits to UNESCO World Heritage sites and national parks.



Town walks

From gold rush towns like Nome and Wrangell to Russia's Alaska capital Sitka, the places you'll visit have a rich history. Haines is historic for being the home of the indigenous Chilkat Tlingit people, while Petersburg is known as 'Little Norway' for its proud Nordic heritage.

Wildlife watching

Alaska's woodlands are home to caribou, moose and over 70% of North America's brown bear population. Many rare birds also tend to be more easily spotted in Alaska. The annual salmon run is eagerly awaited by tourists and locals alike, as well as bears and bald eagles.



Science Center

The microscopes and other high-tech equipment here allow for hands-on demonstrations and workshops, which deepen your understanding of the places you visit. We also invite you to participate in Citizen Science projects, which in turn contribute to important research.

Hiking*

The Expedition Team run guided hikes to viewpoints and sites of interest, like Point Adolphus, an area famous for attracting humpback whales. They'll pick some of the most scenic spots around for you to enjoy.





Lectures and talks

Both on and off the ship, members of our Expedition Team give in-depth lectures on a variety of topics to enhance your expedition experience. The subjects chosen are specific to your destination and will cover the history, culture and wildlife of Alaska.

ALASKA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA -WILDERNESS, GLACIERS AND CULTURE

NORTHBOUND

Journey from Vancouver to Seward and Anchorage to discover Alaska's many fjords, Gold Rush-era history, glistening glaciers, rare wildlife, primeval rainforest, and rich Indigenous and Russian culture.



Sailing past the islands and fjords of the Johnstone Strait north of Vancouver Island, we'll emerge into open sea, continuing up into the Hecate Strait. As your introduction to Alaska, you'll visit the magnificent Misty Fjords wilderness. Next stop is the historic town of Wrangell where you can look for petroglyphs scattered along the beach.

Get your first glimpse of glaciers in either the Tracy or Endicott fjords, and admire the art in the galleries of Haines. William Henry Bay is the site of old-growth forest – and possibly gold to be found – while Point Adolphus is known for superb whale watching. You'll also visit Sitka, the former capital of Alaska when it belonged to Russia.

Southcentral Alaska

Icy Bay is as it sounds, featuring icebergs that have calved off three glaciers further in the bay. In the small salmon fishing town of Cordova, you'll find friendly frontier charm at its finest. We'll then go on to College Fjord, a spectacular stretch of water fringed by snowdusted mountains and numerous glaciers.


You'll disembark in Seward on the Kenai Peninsula beneath Mount Marathon and enjoy a bus ride to Anchorage. You might spot Dall sheep along the route, and even see bison, bears, musk oxen, and elk during our stop at the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center. Your thrilling expedition comes to an end in the modern city of Anchorage, the largest in the state.

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Southcentral Alaska

Your adventure begins with a scenic drive from Anchorage, Alaska's largest city, to Seward, where we'll visit rehabilitated wildlife at Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center. From there, we set sail into the Prince William Sound, exploring College Fjord and Icy Bay, where you'll see spectacular glaciers and have chances to spot such wildlife as humpback whales, Bald Eagles and otters.

We'll lower anchor at William Henry Bay, an old copper and gold mining site. Look out for deer while hiking through the forest with local guides. Next up is Haines, a creative hub. Learn about the town's Chilkat Tlingit roots in the museum and browse the many galleries and boutiques.

Southeast Inside Passage


Crossing Holkham Bay, you'll be treated to magnificent views of either Tracy or Endicott Arm, two pristine fjords with waters so calm they look like mirrors. If weather and ice conditions are favourable, you may even be able to explore the fjords in a kayak.

Your journey continues in Sitka, a town with a blended culture of both Russian and Tlingit influence. Then marvel at the impressive totem poles in Wrangell and Alert Bay. The bustling city of Vancouver marks the end of your expedition cruise.



Wild islands in the Bering Sea

Your expedition cruise begins where renowned explorer Roald Amundsen ended many of his - the Gold Rush town of Nome. Sailing south through the Bering Sea, we'll stop at the wild and remote St Matthew's Island, part of the Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge. Continuing south, we'll head to St Paul Island, home to the largest Aleut community in the US and a designated Important Bird Area. Look out for iconic species here like Tufted Puffins, Pribilof Sandpipers and even the rare Mckay's Bunting.

History-rich towns of the Inside Passage

From there, we'll make our way to America's largest fishing port, Dutch Harbor. Here you can delve into the port's wartime history in the

WWII museum and learn about Indigenous cultures at the Museum of the Aleutia. From there, we'll explore abandoned Unga Village before travelling to Chignik, a small but thriving salmon fishing village where Bald Eagles roam the skies.

Before reaching Kodiak, we'll stop off at the four-millionacre Katmai National Park. This vast reserve is famed for its bear population, including more than 2,000 protected grizzly bears the largest concentration in the world. Marvel at the immense glaciers of Icy Bay as we travel to Sitka with its unique cultural blend. Then see the ancient rock carvings at Wrangell's incredible Petroglyph Beach, before reaching Vancouver - our final destination and where your adventure ends.



Or cruise the Atlantic coast from Halifax, Nova Scotia, to bustling and historic Boston. You'll visit small towns that give Maine and Massachusetts their soul, and chow down on fantastic food. You'll also discover incredible museums and art galleries, explore UNESCO

World Heritage sites and visit historic colonial settlements.

From big-city bustle to small-town charm

As far as contrasts go, the cities and towns along the coasts of North America couldn't be more varied. You'll experience a mixture of modern, cosmopolitan cities, and small towns and communities well off the beaten track. On the west coast, you can enjoy the vibrancy of San Diego and Vancouver as well as the old town charm of places like Santa Barbara and Eureka, California.

Cruising along the eastern seaboard is a wonderful experience. Big cities like Boston, for example, need no introduction. But you'll equally love soaking up the maritime atmosphere in historic seaports like Lunenburg in Nova Scotia. There are also the many charms of Maine in Eastport and the art scene of Provincetown to delve into.

A natural wonderland

Although you'll encounter a range of habitats on any of our North American expedition cruises, they all share one thing in common – stunning natural beauty. Along the coast of northern



California, you'll find the Redwood National and State Parks, home of the tallest, oldest and largest tree species on Earth. Olympic National Park is a place of great biodiversity and you'll explore its sub-alpine region up around Hurricane Ridge.

Known as the 'Crown Jewel of the North Atlantic Coast', Acadia National Park is no less picturesque. Home to over 300 bird species, you'll find towering forests, wildflower meadows, rugged shores, hidden caves, and miles and miles of hiking trails. You can delve into the natural beauty on offer

through optional excursions, including hiking, kayaking and small boat excursions.

Wildlife of North America

The route you take will determine what animals you are likely to encounter, but the range of fauna found along both ocean coasts is impressive. Whale watching is the popular draw - and rightly so - but these shores are also a birdwatcher's delight. They're home to hundreds of bird species, from pelicans to bald eagles. You'll scan for animals including deer, mountain goats, moose and black bears along the way.

Sampling food and wine of the coast

Food is a highlight on any good expedition, and these are no exception. Aside from the sumptuous meals you'll enjoy on the ship, you'll be going ashore to experience some of the best dining experiences on the planet. Perhaps you'll sample world class pinot noir in Santa Barbara, or enjoy the fabled lobster, mussels and scallops of Maine, washed down with a local craft beer. Whatever itinerary you pick, you'll have plenty to sate and surprise your palate.





Halifax

The cosmopolitan capital of Nova Scotia bursts with historical charm, maritime heritage, and a wealth of restaurants and culture. Explore the city's parks and sublime natural landscapes.

Sable Island

More than 500 wild horses, descended from horses originally released here in the late 18th century, roam this long crescent-shaped island, a national park reserve.

<u>Lunenburg</u>

Colourful, laid-back, pretty – these are the words that best describe Nova Scotia's picture-postcard harbour town. Enjoy art and food in this UNESCO-listed treasure.

Acadia National Park

The pretty seaside town of Bar Harbor has some of the finest seafood restaurants in New England. It is also your gateway to the stunning nature of Acadia National Park.

Cape Cod

The Cape offers some of the best sandy beaches in all of the United States. The arts and culture scene is very active, with museums, art galleries and craft shops in every town, notably the artists' colony in Provincetown.

Boston

With its rich revolutionary past, you'll have many historic sites to visit in Boston. Stroll the cobblestone streets and along the waterfront, and enjoy the warm New England hospitality.


On North America's wild side


Much of North America's wildlife is protected within its sizeable national parks. Each of our itineraries features at least one, giving you the chance to see rare and iconic animals in their natural habitat.

The Redwoods and Olympic National Park

Up from San Francisco on the Pacific Coast lies the mighty Redwood National and State Parks. Some of the tallest and oldest trees on Earth provide a forest home for the likes of bobcats, cougars, coyotes, salamanders and flying squirrels.

Olympic National Park sits in Washington State to the west of Seattle. Roosevelt elks and marmots roam the forests while black bears can be





on the coasts for sea otters and sea lions.

Acadia National Park

spotted foraging for berries in the

lowland areas. Scan the skies for the iconic bald eagle, and keep a lookout

Over in Maine, Bar Harbor acts as the gateway to Acadia National Park, which spans around half of Mount Desert Island. Here, you'll discover towering forests, wildflower meadows, rugged shores, hidden caves, and miles and miles of hiking

to frequent the coast here, while white-tailed deer and beavers are commonly seen. Rarer sights include moose and peregrine falcons.





Air bags for deft divers - The Brown Pelican can often be seen dramatically dive-bombing into the waters below for fish, plummeting from as high as 65-70 feet. They can do this repeatedly and come out unfazed due to the frictionreducing angles of 60 or 90 degrees at which they dive. This is also thanks to special air sacs under their skin which inflate during the dive, cushioning the impact and protecting internal organs.



Covered in scars - Humpback whales are visible in the coastal waters of Nova Scotia from April to June or August to October as they migrate between polar and tropical seas. The grey whale is often seen off the Oregon coast and is characterised by grey-white patterns on its skin, which are in fact scars left by parasites which drop off once the whale migrates to colder feeding grounds.



Bear necessities - Black bears are the only bear species found outside the Arctic and western regions of North America, and the only bear in Nova Scotia and parts of California. They are known to approach settled areas for easy food sources like beehives, agricultural crops, and even garbage. They stand about one-metre-high at the shoulder and can weigh up to 200 kilogrammes.




Prepare for adventure, whether you choose to explore North America's Pacific or Atlantic coastlines. Both are home to national parks with diverse habitats and wildlife. Here are several ways you can take in the lush forests and coastal towns of North America.



Kayaking*

One of the great things about kayaking is that if you're really lucky marine life will surface right next to you when you least expect it. It could be a playful dolphin or a curious whale. What's more, the unique oceanic habitat in Maine's Castine Harbor allows bioluminescent phytoplankton to flourish, and if conditions are right, seeing the waters glow from a kayak is a magical experience.

Landings

Each expedition cruise has a range of interesting landing sites and communities to visit. There's history to uncover in the colonial town of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia; art and seafood in Rockland, Maine; and California riviera lifestyle in Santa Barbara. Highlights will certainly include exploring the west coast's Olympic National Park and Redwood National Park, or Acadia National Park in Maine on the eastern seaboard.



Lectures and talks

You'll be sailing with a knowledgeable Expedition Team who are experts in a variety of fields. They give fascinating lectures on relevant topics that include history, geology, and biology. Informal talks and impromptu guiding may also take place out on deck or ashore. There are scientists aboard every ship.



Science programme

During your expedition cruise you'll have access to the ship's Science Center, with information on the landscapes and ecosystems you'll encounter along the way. You can also get involved in various Citizen Science projects that ask you to document wildlife and to send your observations to worldwide research institutes. Scientists sail with you on every cruise.

Birdwatching

The Pacific and Atlantic coasts are home to hundreds of different bird species and colonies. You may spot Common Murres, petrels, or cormorants, Brown Pelicans, various gull species, and Great Blue Herons. You'll likely see several species of shorebirds feeding at the water's edge. If you're lucky, you'll get to see Bald Eagles - the national bird and iconic symbol of the USA - swooping along the beaches of the west and east coasts or patrolling the skies above wetlands.



Food and wine tasting*

The coastal towns and bigger cities offer a multitude of food and drink experiences. Sailing along the coastline means the seafood we taste is fresh, and the lobster juicy. On the west coast, there are numerous wineries, and none more appealing than the ones that await you in Santa Barbara. The chardonnay, pinot noir, and Rhône varieties offered here have made this Californian region a wine-lovers haven.



Hiking*

Your Expedition Team offers guided hikes to sites of interest and viewpoints, based on different activity levels. Prepare to be dwarfed by the giant trees in Redwood National Park. You'll also have guided or unguided hiking trails to choose from in Acadia National Park, taking you through wildflower meadows and dense forests.



Halifax and the Canadian seaboard



Rich in wildlife, this area is home to grey seals, migrating seabirds and even wild horses. Next, you'll visit the former colonial settlement of Lunenburg before continuing to Eastport, Maine. Here, you can stroll the historic downtown district and, if weather conditions are right, join a local lobster-fishing boat to 'Old Sow', a natural whirlpool believed to be the biggest in the Western Hemisphere.

Seafood, art and national parks

When you get to Rockland, you'll experience the delightful charms of smalltown New England, and have the opportunity to savour some succulent, fresh lobster. We'll go on to discover 'Down East' culture in Bar Harbor, which is also your gateway to exploring the wonderful scenery and diverse birdlife of Acadia National Park. In Provincetown, you can walk the National Seashoreprotected sand dunes of Cape Cod and tour the local artist galleries. Your cruise then comes to its close in the historic and characterful city of Boston.



Giving back to the communities

The region is a mix of age-old customs, imported traditions, and European colonial influences. Our commitment to sustainable travel includes forming meaningful relationships with local communities. In Colombia's remote Caribbean community of Cabo de la Vela, we'll introduce you to the Indigenous Wayúu people. You'll learn about their culture and traditions, and you can join excursions with local guides.

Adventures on land and sea

Enjoy a range of excursions, as well as pre or post-cruise adventures to make the most of your expedition cruise. Take a thrilling boat ride up the Belize River to see magnificent manatees as they peacefully graze on seagrass. Witness spectacular coral and colourful fish while snorkelling in Belize's famed barrier reef, or travel back to the 16th century as you wander the impressive, UNESCO-listed centre of Cartagena de Indias.



Slow and steady

The sandy beaches of the Caribbean with their gently lapping waves are the perfect ecosystem for its oldest inhabitants - sea turtles. Six of the seven known species are found in this region.

Optional snorkelling opportunities, perhaps on Belize's famed barrier reef, will give you a chance to scan for loggerhead, hawksbill and green turtles. If you're lucky, you might spot the iconic leatherback turtle in the UNESCO marine sites in Bocas del Toro, a wildlife-rich archipelago off the coast of Panama.

Same habitat, opposite habits

A highlight of an optional hike in the forest at the Tayrona National Park in Colombia is the chance of spotting two very different animals - monkeys and sloths. You'll hear howler monkeys before you see them their calls can be heard as far as three miles away. Jumpy spider monkeys are usually nearby, as well as white-faced capuchins with their distinctive black caps.

Unlike their noisy, never-sit-still treetop neighbours, sloths are silent and extremely slowpaced. You'll see them avoiding anything strenuous, hanging upside down in large-leaved trees feeding - or more likely - sleeping.



Get up close to the action in this tropical region that's ripe for exploration. Whether you're an active adventurer or prefer to take things more sedately, there's a range of included and optional activities for everyone.




Landings

Embark on small boats to make landings at sites set in the beautiful scenery which are hard to reach and off the beaten track, adding to your sense of discovery when you do. Look forward to exploring smaller, less-visited islands of the Caribbean and meeting the local communities that call them home.

Lectures

Bird watching

Central America and the Caribbean is a birdwatcher's paradise. From mountain ranges and rainforests to coastal areas, you can spot hundreds of bird species in pristine surroundings. Scan for frigate birds and boobies from deck, pelicans along the coast, and parrots and hummingbirds in the jungle.



Stand-up paddleboarding*

The warm and clear waters of the Caribbean Sea are perfect for stand-up paddleboarding. It will give you a unique view of what's under the water and out on the horizon. With only a little instruction, you'll be able to stand on the board, paddling away, looking at the colourful forms of exotic fish darting in and out of coral reefs beneath you.




Hiking*

Snorkelling*

The Caribbean and Central America offer great possibilities for snorkelling. Beneath the waters is a colourful world full of marine life, spectacular coral reef landscapes, and even the occasional submerged shipwreck.





TROPICAL WATERS AND REMOTE ISLAND COMMUNITIES IN THE CARIBBEAN

Your adventure begins in the 'City of Neon', Miami. From here, we head south to experience a slice of Mayan heritage before disconnecting from the rest of the world as you encounter island living, vibrant sea life and mesmerising coral reefs.

Mayan majesty

Belize is home to several Mayan ruins, but arguably none as famous as Altun Ha, just outside of Belize City. It's one of the best-restored Mayan sites, enabling you to get a true sense of the ancient civilisation.

A sea of flora and fauna

White sandy beaches, densely forested islands and a rich variety of sea life await you. We will explore the Belize section of the large Mesoamerican Barrier Reef, one of the world's largest reefs, second only to Australia's Great Barrier.

Then continue into Honduran Isla Útila, famous for its amazing snorkelling possibilities, the old town of Trujillo, one of the oldest European settlements in the Americas, and the seldomvisited Cayos Miskitos, off

the Caribbean coast of Nicaragua. UNESCO's Seaflower Biosphere Reserve in the waters around Isla de Providencia has inspired a nickname: the 'Sea of Seven Colours'. In Bocas del Toro, you may have a few optional excursions to spot the exotic wildlife in the UNESCO-listed national marine park here.


Island communities

One of the highlights of an expedition cruise with Hurtigruten Expeditions is learning about the island communities we'll be visiting. 

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Few places on Earth provide the rich diversity of South America. Visit the archaeological treasures of great ancient civilisations like the Incas, Nazca and Chimú; discover incredible biodiversity in the rainforests, mangroves and coastal plains; relax on the beaches and experience the fascinating melting pot of cultures that influence its vibrant towns and cities.

Choose from a wide range of itineraries that take you to destinations in Panama, Ecuador, Peru and Chile. Several expedition cruises also allow you to pick one of these iconic highlights – the 'Lost City' of Machu Picchu, the cultures of Lake Titicaca, or that marvel of modern engineering, the Panama Canal.

Lost empires

Long before the conquistadors arrived, great Pre-Columbian indigenous civilisations such as the Moche, Chimú and – most famous of all – the Incas inhabited the region. There are ancient ruins of city complexes, sun-worshipping pyramid temples, and imposing fortresses to discover. The area around Pisco near Nazca is famous for mysterious geoglyphs while few sites are as iconic or as impressive as Machu Picchu high above the Sacred Valley.

Age of discovery

Spanish conquistadors arrived on the continent in the late 1400s and 1500s, bringing colonial influences which inspired the architecture that continues to charm so many today. You'll see some of the best examples of the neo-colonial style in UNESCO-listed Valparaíso, La Serena, the 'City of Churches' in Chile, and the World Heritage historic centre in Lima, Peru.

A cultural kaleidoscope

South America is comprised of a fascinating melting pot of cultures. See authentic Panama hats still being handwoven in Ecuador, visit the Afro-Colombian community at Bahía Solano, meet the Indigenous Kawésqar people in remote Puerto Edén, or step onto the floating reed islands of the Uru people on Lake Titicaca.

Andean scenery

Depending on your itinerary, you'll explore the Pacific coastal plains, mangroves and tropical forests of the northern Latin American countries or head down to the glacial landscapes of Torres del Paine National Park and the Chilean fjords of Patagonia. Visit nature reserves like the Paracas National Reserve, with its otherworldly yellow sand dunes and red beaches, or beautiful isles like the Ballestas Islands in Peru.

El Dorado of biodiversity

South America is the world's most biodiverse region with an unparalleled number of plant and animal species, many native to the continent. Spot the Andean Condor, Blue-footed Boobies, iguanas, monkeys, guanacos, sloths, armadillos, coatis, and many more.

A union of flavours

Lima sits at the gastronomic heart of South America's culinary renaissance, serving up a feast of street food and fine dining. For lovers of fresh fish, ceviche and tiradito are a must. Enjoy Chinese-Peruvian style cooking, Chifa, and try picarones, an African-fusion dessert made from pumpkin dough and sugar cane. Then finish off your meal with a pisco sour, made from the local brandy.

The Best in Biodiversity

See an astonishing array of wildlife in the diverse Pacific coast biomes of South America, from tropical rainforests above the Equator to the fjords and glaciers of Patagonia.

A birdwatchers' paradise

From the tiny hummingbird to the mighty Andean Condor, the sea cliffs and rainforest canopies of South America are home to more than 3,000 species of birds. Over 2,500 are endemic to the region, such as El Oro Parakeet.

With its oversized yellow bill, the toco is one of the most recognisable tropical birds of South America. Their







King of birds - The Andean Condor, with a wingspan reaching up to 10 feet, is one of the largest birds in the world. These scavengers live in the Andes and feed on the carrion of deer, cattle and even seals, and can travel 125 miles in search of food. Black with bald heads, Andean Condors have a distinctive collar of white neck feathers. Their head and neck feathers change colour depending on their mood.



Great diver, terrible dancer

Blue-footed Boobies are exceptional divers, able to swoop from 80 feet to catch fish. Their webbed feet range from pale turquoise to dark blue and indicate how healthy they are. During courtship, male boobies parade their bright feet to the female in a high-stepping strut. However, their name comes from the Spanish 'bobo' meaning 'stupid', due to their clumsy waddle when on land.



Shaggy-haired friends

South America's iconic llamas, alpacas, vicuña and guanacos are all part of the camel family. The latter two are generally wild while llamas and alpacas are bred in herds. Alpacas have fine, shaggy hair which transforms into superior quality wool, and the llama's larger size gives it a sturdy frame to carry goods.

colourful beaks measure nearly half their body length and play a vital role in courtship rituals, self-defence and balance.

Animal magic

In the tropical rainforests of South America, you might encounter sloths lolling overhead; howler monkeys with spine-tingling roars; docile iguanas hiding in plain sight; or crocodiles and alligators in the mangroves. Further south, look out for wild guanacos and huemuls (Andean deer). The warm Pacific waters are home to manta rays, whales, sharks, sea lions, green turtles and dolphins.

Bird watching

South America is home to over 2,500 native bird species that include brightly coloured tropical birds, birds of prey and seabirds. Spot toucans in Ecuador's Chocó rainforest or Humboldt Penguins in the Ballestas Islands, Peru.

Sometimes called a 'living laboratory', the remote Galápagos Islands are a unique example of pristine nature, giving us an insight into the very processes of life on Earth. Due to the uniqueness of each island, a huge range of terrestrial and aquatic wildlife flourishes in this haven of biodiversity.

What's more, having evolved with no major predators, much of the wildlife is impervious to the presence of people and remains remarkably tame. A crucible of evolution

archipelago formed millions of years ago when subsea eruptions pushed up a group of volcanic islands. Due to their remoteness, they were at first arid and barren, but were soon colonised by rainforest animals from Central and South America floating across on rafts of vegetation.

Only the birds and reptiles could survive such a long voyage, and so the Galápagos became seeded by new arrivals, free from mammalian predators. Each species was compelled to adapt to the often very different island environments, making natural selection apparent to Darwin when he arrived. You'll learn all about this and more as your knowledgeable onboard Expedition Team inform and educate you by way of onboard lectures and guided nature walks.

Quito

Ecuador's capital features beautiful UNESCO-protected architecture and has an eternal spring-like climate. Enjoy delicious local cuisine in the many restaurants and browse the handicrafts in the artisanal shops.

Genovesa Island

Small and remote, Genovesa Island is a haven for birdlife with large colonies of Nazca Boobies, Red-footed Boobies, Great Frigatebirds and Storm Petrels.

North Seymour Island

The island is a great site for spotting colonies of Blue-footed Boobies and Swallow-tailed Gulls. Sea lions and marine iguanas also congregate here, attracted by the bountiful sea life.

SANTA CRUZ ISLAND

Baltra Island (South Seymour Island)

A section of the ocean floor blasted to the surface to create this flat island which now hosts one of the islands' main airports. Many Galápagos adventures start here.

South Plaza Island

South Plaza has a stunning array of flora and a wide variety of wildlife, from frigatebirds and Swallow-tailed Gulls to Galápagos Shearwaters and marine iguanas.

Santa Fe Island

With white sand beaches where sea lions laze in the sun, Santa Fe Island is the perfect tranquil island for a spot of snorkelling.

Here you'll find the Charles Darwin Research Station, where you can see recently hatched tortoises and Darwin's famous finches. The island also has lush highlands where giant tortoises thrive.

Floreana Island

The highlights of this small island include the picturesque flamingo lagoon at Cormorant Point, the breathtaking views from Baroness Cove, and some of the best snorkelling around at Champion Islet.

Española Island

This island is a wildlife haven with Blue-footed Boobies, Nazca Boobies, Waved Albatrosses and marine iguanas. It's also home to El Soplador, a blowhole that blasts water 75 ft into the air.



Explore the vast archipelago of diverse volcanic islands as we take you on a guided voyage around one of the planet's most beautiful and biodiverse destinations. From rocky and arid islands dominated by cacti and iguanas, to the lush tropical highlands of Santa Cruz where giant tortoises amble, you'll experience a range of habitats and climatic conditions.

Our onboard Expedition Team are friendly Galápagos experts with many years of experience in these islands. They'll join you on shore landings and nature walks, sharing their knowledge of natural history and explaining conservation efforts. With most wildlife is unafraid of humans, you'll be getting far closer to much of it than you might be used to. Of course, we'll always maintain a respectable distance to avoid inadvertently disturbing the animals.



Kayaking and SUP boarding

Some places are ideally suited to exploration aboard a kayak. We have a number of sea kayaks onboard for such a purpose, and they're perfect for paddling the waters around Santa Fe, Española and Santa Cruz. Alternatively, why not try out SUP boarding – our expedition ship also carries a number of boards for your enjoyment.

Nature walks

Exploring the various islands on foot turns an experience into an adventure. You'll be heading ashore a lot and walking on trails that lead through a range of distinct ecosystems. Depending on the itinerary, you could be walking amidst the silvery Palo Santo trees with their delicate incense scent on North Seymour, watching giant tortoises lumber through the undergrowth on Santa Cruz, or walking to the sea lion colony on Santa Fe.



Landings with expedition boats

Our small expedition boats allow you to land on beaches and terrain that would otherwise be too rugged for larger vessels to get close to. They're great for wildlife watching, so we'll be on the lookout for marine creatures as we head to and from the ship. Try the glass-bottomed boat and observe marine life and reefs from above - it's like snorkelling without getting in the water!

Snorkelling

What could be better than drifting over a colourful reef and seeing the amazing marine life illuminated in the crystal-clear water? We have all the snorkelling gear you'll need and our expert Expedition Team will bring you to some pretty amazing places where you might see placid turtles, colourful fish, diving marine iguanas and curious sea lions performing underwater acrobatics. If you want to wear a wetsuit, we have some available for hire.



Lectures and talks

Your Expedition Team are the most recent link in a chain of experts with many years of experience exploring the Galápagos Islands. They'll give in-depth lectures on a variety of topics to enhance your learning. The subjects chosen are specific to where you are on your cruise and will teach you about the Galápagos Islands, their wild-life, and current conservation efforts.



Conservation and research centres

The Galápagos Islands are the focus for global conservation and research efforts. We'll visit the Charles Darwin Research Station, where over 200 scientists and volunteers are engaged in projects to boost biodiversity. You'll see baby tortoises being reared in incubation pens, as well as other inspiring conservation success stories. Another project, on San Cristobal, is set in a forest that doubles as a tortoise reserve – here you'll see these gentle giants in their natural habitat.





Wildlife watching

Your expedition cruise in the Galápagos Islands will be – let's face it – one continuous wildlife watching experience. Because animals here evolved without many predators they have no fear of humans, meaning you can get closer to photograph them lazing around on the beaches and volcanic rocks – or in the case of giant tortoises, ambling peacefully along. 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TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. YOUR CONTRACT

These Booking Terms and Conditions together with our privacy policy, the information contained in your brochure and any other written information that we brought to your attention before we confirmed your booking, form the basis of your contract with Hurtigruten Ltd whose registered office is at Bedford House, 69-79 Fulham High Street, London, SW6 3JW (Company No: 02865967), a company wholly owned by Hurtigruten AS.

When you book an air package holiday or sailing with us the contract between us will exist as soon as you or your travel agent asks us to confirm your booking. We then become responsible to provide you with the voyage arrangements or air package holiday you have booked and you become responsible to pay for them, in each case subject to these terms and conditions. You will also become responsible to pay for any additional arrangements made by us on your behalf including International Flights not included in any air package, optional excursions, travel insurance or other arrangements requested by you and booked.

When you make a booking you guarantee you have the authority to accept and do accept on behalf of your party the terms of these booking conditions and accept responsibility for making all payments to us for all members of the party. We are unable to accept provisional or conditional bookings. We will send all documents and other information to you and you will be responsible for ensuring that all other members of the party are kept fully informed.

A confirmation invoice which you should check as soon as you receive it will be sent on receipt of your deposit. If you wish to change or cancel any arrangements later you may have to pay an amendment or cancellation charge and additional costs (see clauses 6 and 7 below) which may be as much as the whole of the original price of your arrangements. Only one invoice and one set of documents will be issued. No verbal amendments may be made by either party to these written booking conditions; any change must be in writing signed by the Chief Executive of Hurtigruten AS.

If your confirmed arrangements include a flight, we (or if you booked via an authorised agent of ours, that agent) will issue you with an ATOL Certificate and a confirmation. Upon receipt, if you believe that any details on the ATOL Certificate or confirmation or any other document are wrong you must advise us immediately.

If you book your holiday through a travel agent all communication must be through that agent. Please quote your booking reference number in all communications.

You are responsible for complying with any visa or other entry requirements for you or any of your party who are not full European Union Passport Holders.

2. YOUR FINANCIAL PROTECTION

We provide financial security for flight inclusive Packages and ATOL protected flights. We do this by way

of a Escrow held in favour of the Civil Aviation Authority (www.caa.co.uk; 45-59 Kingsway, London WC2B 6TE) under ATOL number 3584.

When you buy an ATOL protected flight or flight inclusive holiday from us you will receive an ATOL Certificate. This lists what is financially protected, where you can get information on what this means for you and who to contact if things go wrong. For further information, visit the ATOL website at www.atol.org.uk. The price of our flight inclusive Arrangements includes the amount of £2.50 per person as part of the ATOL Protection Contribution (APC) we pay to the CAA. This charge is included in our advertised prices. Not all holiday or travel services offered and sold by us will be protected by the ATOL Scheme. ATOL protection extends primarily to Customers who book and pay in the United Kingdom.

We, or the suppliers identified on your ATOL Certificate, will provide you with the services listed on the ATOL Certificate (or a suitable alternative). In some cases, where neither we nor the supplier are able to do so for reasons of insolvency, an alternative ATOL holder may provide you with the services you have bought (at no extra cost to you). You agree to accept that in those circumstances the alternative ATOL holder will perform those obligations and you agree to pay any money outstanding to be paid by you under your contract to that alternative ATOL holder. However, you also agree that in some cases it will not be possible to appoint an alternative ATOL holder, in which case you will be entitled to make a claim under the ATOL Scheme (or your credit card issuer where applicable).

If we, or the suppliers identified on your ATOL certificate, are unable to provide the services listed (or a suitable alternative, through an alternative ATOL holder or otherwise) for reasons of insolvency, the Trustees of the Air Travel Trust may make a payment to (or confer a benefit on) you under the ATOL scheme. You agree that in return for such a payment or benefit you assign absolutely to those Trustees any claims which you have or may have arising out of or relating to the non-provision of the services, including any claim against us, the travel agent (or your credit card issuer where applicable). You also agree that any such claims may be re-assigned to another body, if that other body has paid sums you have claimed under the ATOL scheme.

We provide financial security for holidays not including flights by way of a Escrow held with ABTA (www.abta.com; 30 Park Street, London SE1 9EO).

If you book Arrangements other than an ATOL protected flight or Package from us, your monies will not be financially protected. Please ask us for further details.

3. PAYMENT

Once you have asked us to confirm your booking the total price of the arrangements you have booked is due and is payable as follows:

(i) If you book more than 60 days (90 days for Expedition voyages) before your scheduled departure date a non-refundable deposit of 20%. The balance is due 60 days before your

scheduled departure date. (90 days for Expedition voyages). No second invoice will be sent. Travel documents will be issued 7 to 14 days prior to departure.

(ii) If you book less than 90 days before your scheduled departure date the full price is payable when you book.

Our preferred method of deposit payment is by bank debit card or credit card. Balance payment may be made by cash, bank debit card, credit card or cheque (providing there is time to clear it to meet the payment schedule shown above – you should allow 5 working days for clearance from the time we receive it).

Online Bookings

Bookings made online that cost less than £800 or made within 90 days of departure require full payment at the time of booking and no refund is made if cancelled.

Your booking may be cancelled if we do not receive payment by the due date (we will not normally send reminders) and cancellation charges as set out under 'If You Cancel' (see below) will be payable by you.

4. FITNESS TO TRAVEL ON THE SHIP, PREGNANCY, DISABILITY OR REDUCED MOBILITY, MEDICAL/MOBILITY EQUIPMENT

In order to ensure that the Carrier is able to carry passengers safely and in accordance with applicable safety requirements established by international, EU or national law or in order to meet safety requirements established by competent authorities including the ships flag state every Passenger warrants that he/she is fit to travel by sea and that his/her conduct or condition will not impair the safety of the ship or inconvenience the other passengers. We reserve the right to require any Passenger to produce medical evidence of fitness to travel in order to assess whether that Passenger can be carried safely in accordance with applicable international, EU or national law. If we consider it necessary, we are entitled to administer a health questionnaire prior to boarding.

If it appears to us, the Master or the Company's nominated medical representative that a Passenger is for any reason unfit to travel, likely to endanger safety, or likely to be refused permission to land at any port, or likely to render the Carrier liable for Passenger maintenance, support or repatriation, then the Carrier or the Master shall have the right to take any of the following courses:

- (i) Refuse to embark the Passenger at any port;
- (ii) Disembark the Passenger at any port;
- (iii) Transfer the Passenger to another berth or cabin;
- (iv) If the Company's nominated medical representative considers it advisable, to place or confine him/her or to transfer the Passenger to a health facility at any port, at the Passenger's expense;
- (v) To administer first aid and administer any drug, medicine or

other substance or to admit and/or confine the Passenger to a hospital or other similar institution at any port provided that the ship's nominated medical representative and/or Master considers that any such steps are necessary.

Where a Passenger is refused embarkation as a result of safety and/or fitness to travel, neither we nor the carrier shall be liable for any loss or expense occasioned to the passenger thereby, nor shall the passenger be entitled to any compensation from the Carrier.

Passengers who need assistance and/or have special requests or need special facilities or equipment with regard to accommodation, seating or services required or need to bring medical equipment must notify us at the time of booking. If there are any particular conditions, disabled or reduced mobility which require personal care or supervision then such personal care or supervision must be organised by the passenger and at the passenger's expense. Those passengers confined to wheelchairs must furnish their own standard size foldable wheelchairs but needn't be accompanied by a travelling companion. Unless we and or the Carrier agree otherwise and in writing Passengers are limited to bringing 2 items of such mobility or medical equipment on board per cabin with a total value not exceeding £2,200. All equipment must be capable of being carried safety and must be declared before the sailing. The Carrier may decline to carry such equipment where it is not safe to do so or where it has not been notified in time to enable a risk assessment to be carried out.

Pregnant women are welcome onboard our cruises, however, we recommend seeking medical advice prior to travel at any stage of the pregnancy. For the sake of the mother and baby, a medical certificate may also be needed at certain stages of the pregnancy.

Up to 4 weeks before the due date

A medical certificate is not needed.

Between 2-4 weeks before the due date

A medical certificate is needed to travel with us.

Less than 2 weeks before the due date

For the sake of the mother-to-be and the baby, pregnant mothers are not permitted to travel with us less than 2 weeks before the due date.

5. A - PRICES

All Voyage prices shown in this brochure are in pounds sterling and are per person based on full occupancy of the cabin accommodation unless otherwise stated.

Single/Sole occupancy of cabins with more than one berth is at our discretion as single/sole use of multiple berth cabins will be limited. We reserve the right to change any of the prices quoted in this brochure although there will be no change within 30 days of your departure date. You will be advised of the current price of the voyage or air package holiday you wish to book before your contract is confirmed.

The price of your confirmed holidays is subject at all times to variations in:

- (i) the price of transportation resulting from the cost of fuel or other power sources:
- (ii) the level of taxes or fees applicable to the holiday imposed by third parties not directly involved in the performance of your holiday, including tourist taxes, landing taxes or embarkation or disembarkation fees at ports and airports; or
- (iii) the exchange rates relevant to your package.

You will be charged for the amount of any increase in accordance with this clause and, where this is necessary, we will notify you of the relevant adjustments by issuing a new invoice. However, if this means that you have to pay an increase of more than 8% of the total price of your confirmed holiday (excluding any amendment charges and/or additional services or travel arrangements), you will have the option of accepting the price increase and paying the requested amount, accepting a change to another holiday if we are able to offer one (if this is of equivalent or higher quality you will not have to pay more but if it is of lower quality you will be refunded the difference in price), or cancelling and receiving a full refund of all monies paid to us, except for any amendment charges and/or additional services or travel arrangements not forming part of your package. Should you decide to cancel for this reason, you must exercise your right to do so within 14 days from the issue date on your new invoice.

Should the price of your voyage or air package holiday go down due to changes above then any refund due will be paid to you, less an administration fee of £60. Please note that travel arrangements are not always purchased in local currency and some apparent changes have no impact on the price of your travel due to contractual or other protection in place.

There will be no change made to the price of your confirmed holiday within 20 days of your departure nor will refunds be paid during this period.

5. B - VOYAGE AND AIR PACKAGE HOLIDAY

Prices Do Not Include:

• Travel Insurance • Luggage Handling • International Flights except where included in the Air Package Holiday Price • Optional Excursions • Gratuities

Optional Excursions booked before you travel or local excursions or other activities that you may choose to book and pay for whilst on holiday are not part of your voyage or air package holiday arrangements provided by us nor are we agents for the provider of the service. For any excursion or other activity you book before departure or with which you are assisted in arranging whilst on holiday, your contract will solely be with the supplier of the excursion or activity and not with Hurtigruten. We are not responsible for the provision of your excursion or activity or for anything that happens during the course of its provision by the supplier.

6. IF YOU CHANGE OR TRANSFER YOUR BOOKING

If you wish to change your travel arrangements after they have been confirmed we will do our utmost to help but it may not always be possible. Any request for changes to be made must be in writing by the person who made the booking or your travel agent. You will be asked to pay an administration charge of £60 per person and any further cost we incur in making this alteration. NB: most airlines will charge a fee for ticket changes. Costs may increase the closer to the departure date that changes are made. For example, the transfer within 60 days of departure of arrangements involving a scheduled flight will mean the cancellation and re-booking of this flight and a significant additional charge.

If you change the number of people in your party, the price of the arrangements will be recalculated for the new party size e.g. this may mean that accommodation is under-occupied and each member of the party may have to pay an increased price.

Any increase in price caused by changes you have requested is not a cancellation charge even though it may arise because a member of your party has cancelled. Any change by you to your confirmed arrangements after departure is in all cases subject to availability and any relevant costs.

Transfer of Booking: If any member of your party is prevented from travelling, that person(s) may transfer their place to someone else, subject to the following conditions:

- that person is introduced by you and satisfies all the conditions applicable to the Arrangements:
- we are notified no less than 7 days before departure;
- you pay any outstanding balance payment, an administration fee of £60 per person as well as any additional fees, charges or other costs arising from the transfer; and
- the transferee agrees to these booking conditions and all other requirements applicable to the holiday booking.

You and the transferee remain jointly and severally liable for payment of all sums.

If you are unable to find a replacement, cancellation charges as set out will apply in order to cover our estimated costs. Otherwise, no refunds will be given for passengers not travelling or for unused services.

7. IF YOU CANCEL BEFORE DEPARTURE

You, or any member of your party, may cancel your travel arrangements at any time. Written confirmation from the person who made the booking or your travel agent must be received by us via email or our offices. For postal cancellations, we recommend recorded delivery. Cancellation takes effect the day we receive your letter or email. Since we incur costs in relation to your arrangements from the time we confirm your booking you will have to pay the applicable cancellation charges as shown in the table below (which also applies if we cancel because you have failed to make payments on time – see 'Payment' section) together with the cost of any

air fare for which we have had to pay at the time of the booking and will be payable immediately on cancellation.

If you have to cancel for a reason covered by your travel insurance you may be able to reclaim the cancellation charges, less applicable excess. Insurance premiums are not refundable.

8. IF YOU CANCEL DUE TO FORCE MAJEURE

You have the right to cancel your confirmed holiday before departure without paying a cancellation charge in the event of unavoidable and extraordinary circumstances occurring at your holiday destination or its immediate vicinity and significantly affecting the performance of the holiday or which significantly affects transport arrangements to the destination. In these circumstances, we shall provide you with a full refund of the monies you have paid but we will not be liable to pay you any compensation. Please see clause 10 for more information on Force Majeure.

9. IF WE CHANGE OR CANCEL YOUR BOOKING

We reserve the right to change any of the details, and correct any errors in this brochure or invoices at any time. If changes are made before you have made your booking we will advise you before we confirm your arrangements.

We reserve the right in any circumstances to cancel your travel arrangements (for example if a minimum number of participants for a particular travel arrangements not reached, we may have to cancel it) and to change airline, aircraft types vessels and itineraries without liability for any subsequent loss. Even after we have confirmed your booking we may have to cancel or make alterations to your booking but we will not cancel your travel arrangements less than 60 days before your departure except for reasons of force majeure or failure by you to pay the final balance in full. Most alterations will be minor and while we will do our best to notify you or your travel agent of any changes as soon as reasonably possible if there is time before your departure, we will have no other liability to you.

Occasionally we may have to make a significant change ("Significant Change") to your confirmed arrangements. Significant Changes include the following:

Change of UK departure airport. Note: A change from one London airport to another is not considered a Significant Change. London airports are Heathrow, Gatwick, Stansted, Luton and London City.

Change of your time of departure or return by more than 12 hours.

Change of your flight from a day flight to a night flight if this also includes

a change to your departure time of 3 hours or more.

Change of resort.

Change of holiday accommodation to accommodation of a lower official rating.

[†] For the purposes of the contract night flights are those which depart from the UK between 2200 and 0600 hours or arrive in the UK between 2400 and 0600 hours.

If we have to make a Significant Change we will notify you as soon as possible and you may either:

(a) accept the Significant Change and the contract between us will then be varied to incorporate the change; or

(b) take alternative arrangements altogether (subject to availability). If the alternative arrangements selected are a lower price than those originally confirmed the difference will (if already paid) be refunded to you; or

(c) withdraw from the booking completely in which case we will, as soon as possible, refund all money paid to us.

You must inform us of your decision as soon as reasonably possible and not later than 7 days of being informed of the alteration. If you choose (a) or (b) above, you will receive as compensation a credit towards the cost of your arrangements, or any alternative selected, as per the amount shown in Scale A below. If you choose (c) we will pay you compensation shown in Scale B below. In all cases we will have no liability for any other or greater compensation or for expenses or losses incurred.

IMPORTANT NOTE: We will not pay you compensation in the following circumstances:

where we make a change that is not a Significant Change;

where we make a Significant Change or cancel your arrangements more than 60 days before departure;

where we have to cancel your arrangements as a result of your failure to make full payment on time;

where the change or cancellation by us arises out of alterations to the confirmed booking requested by you;

where we are forced to cancel or change your arrangements due to Force Majeure (see clause 10).

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Please note: where arrangements with a higher price than the original arrangements are offered by us and accepted by you, the difference in price will be deducted from any compensation payable. In no case will we pay compensation if the arrangements offered by us and accepted by you are of a higher price than those originally booked by you and in the same location where no additional payment is made by you. If we become unable to provide a significant proportion of the arrangements that you have booked with us after you have departed, we will make alternative arrangements for you at no extra charge and, if appropriate in all the circumstances, will pay you reasonable compensation.

A flight or ship delay does not constitute a change to holiday arrangements.

10. FORCE MAJEURE

Except where otherwise expressly stated in these Booking Conditions we are unable to accept liability or pay compensation where the performance or prompt performance of our contractual obligation is prevented or affected by reason of circumstances amounting to 'force majeure' i.e. any event which we or the supplier(s) of the service(s) could not, even with due care foresee or avoid. Such events may include, but are not limited to, war, threat of war or civil commotions, riots, terrorist activity, industrial dispute, natural or nuclear disaster, adverse weather, fire, flood, drought, government action, airport and port regulations and closures, technical transportation problems, maintenance to vessels, scheduling of transport and similar events outside our control.

A flight or ship delay does not constitute a change to holiday arrangements.

11. COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

If there is a problem during your holiday, you must report it on board immediately or to the relevant airline, ground handler, hotelier or other supplier, so that prompt efforts can be made to resolve the problem. In the unlikely event that a problem cannot be resolved at the time and you wish to complain, you must send us full written details within 28 days of your return.

Failure to take either or both of these steps will prejudice our ability to resolve your problem and / or investigate it fully. In consequence, any right to compensation you may have will be extinguished or, at the very least, substantially reduced.

Where the port of embarkation for your sailing is in the EU then any complaints relating to EU Regulation 1177/2010 on Passenger Rights when travelling by Sea and Inland waterways must be made to us in writing no later than 2 months after return from travel or the date on which the service complained of was performed. We will provide a final reply within 2 months. You must supply full details to enable us to deal with your complaint.

Please note that we offer an Alternative Dispute Resolution service through our ABTA membership. Please see clause 12 for further details. You can also access the European Commission Online Dispute (ODR) Resolution platform at http://ec.europa.eu/consumers/odr/. This ODR platform is a means of registering your complaint with us; it will not determine how your complaint should be resolved.

12. ABTA

We are a Member of ABTA, membership number V7545. We are obliged to maintain a high standard of service to you by ABTA's Code of Conduct. We can also offer you ABTA's scheme for the resolution of disputes which is approved by the Chartered Trading Standards Institute. If we can't resolve your complaint, go to www.abta.com to use ABTA's simple procedure. Further information on the Code and ABTA's assistance in resolving disputes can be found on www.abta.com.

13. OUR LIABILITY TO YOU

(i) We will accept responsibility for those arrangements we agree to provide or arrange for you as an 'organiser' under the Package Travel, Package Holidays and Package Tours Regulations 1992 and the EU Directive 2015/2302 on Package Travel (and subsequent UK regulations) as set out below. Subject to these booking conditions, if we or our suppliers perform or arrange your contracted holiday arrangements negligently, taking into consideration all relevant factors, we will pay you reasonable compensation. The level of such compensation will be calculated taking into consideration all relevant factors such as but not limited to: following the complaints procedure as described in these conditions and the extent to which ours or our employees' or suppliers' negligence affected the overall enjoyment of your holiday. Please note that it is your responsibility to show that we or our supplier(s) have been negligent if you wish to make a claim against us.

(iii) Where death and or personal injury and or loss of or damage to property occurs during carriage by air or by sea then liability and the extent of damages recoverable will be dealt with by International Conventions as set out in paragraphs (v) and (vi) and not otherwise.

(iv) As set out in these booking conditions we limit the maximum amount we may have to pay you for any claims you may make against us which do not involve personal injury, illness or death. Except where loss of and/or damage to luggage or personal possessions is concerned if we are found liable to you on any basis the maximum amount we will have to pay you is twice the price (excluding insurance premiums and amendment charges) paid by or on behalf of the person(s) affected in total unless a lower limitation applies to your claim under clause 13 (vi) below.

(v) Where any claim or part of a claim (including those involving death or personal injury) concerns or is based on any travel arrangements (including the process of getting on and/or off the transport concerned) provided by any air, sea, rail or road carrier or any stay in a hotel, the maximum amount of compensation we will have to pay you will be limited. The most we will have to pay you for that claim or that part of a claim if we are found liable to you on any basis is the most the carrier

or hotel keeper concerned would have to pay under the international convention or regulation which applies to the travel arrangements or hotel stay in question. (for example, the Warsaw Convention as amended or unamended and the Montreal Convention for international travel by air and/or for airlines with an operating licence granted by an EU country, the EC Regulation on Air Carrier Liability No 889/2002 for national and international travel by air, the Athens convention for international travel by sea).

Please note: Where a carrier or hotel would not be obliged to make any payment to you under the applicable International Convention or Regulation in respect of a claim or part of a claim, we similarly are not obliged to make a payment to you for that claim or part of the claim. When making any payment, we are entitled to deduct any money which you have received or are entitled to receive from the transport provider or hotelier for the complaint or claim in question. Copies of the applicable International Conventions and Regulations are available from us on request. We do not have any liability to you by virtue of the Regulation 261/2004 which applies solely to the operating carrier. Any liability we may have to you under our contract with you, arising out of the same facts, is limited to the remedies provided under the Regulation as if (for this purpose only) we were a carrier; any sums you receive from the carrier will be deducted from any amount due from ourselves

(vi) Travel by sea is governed by the provisions of the Convention Relating to the Carriage of Passengers and their Luggage by Sea 1974 as amended in 1976 ("The Athens Convention) and where applicable from 1 January 2013 EU Regulation 392/2009 relating to the Liability of carriers of passengers by sea in the event of accidents ("EU Regulation 392/2009). For the purposes of the Athens Convention and EU Regulation 392/2009 we are the Contracting Carrier

The Athens Convention and EU Regulation 392/2009 limit the Carriers' liability for death or personal injury or loss or damage to luggage and makes special provision for valuables. It is presumed that luggage has been delivered to you undamaged unless written notice is given by us and/or the performing Carrier.

a) in the case of apparent damage, before or at the time of disembarkation or redelivery; or

b) in the case of damage which is not apparent or of loss, within 15 days from the date of disembarkation or redelivery or from the time when such redelivery should have taken place.

Damages for cabin luggage payable by the Carrier are limited up to the Athens Convention limit of 833 SDRs or 2250 SDRs if EU Regulation 392/2009 applies. Limits shall be reduced in proportion to any contributory negligence by the Client and by the maximum deductible specified in Article 8(4) of the Athens Convention or EU Regulation 392/2009.

In so far as we may be liable to a Client in respect of claims arising out of carriage by sea, we shall be entitled to all the rights, defences, immunities and limitations available, respectively, to the actual carrier and under the relevant Conventions and nothing in these Booking Conditions shall be deemed as a surrender thereof. To the extent that any provision in these Booking Conditions is made null and void by the Athens Convention or EU Regulation 392/2009 or any legislation compulsorily applicable or is otherwise unenforceable, it shall be void to that extent but not further.

Any liability in respect of death and personal injury and loss of and damage to luggage which we may incur to you shall always be subject to the limits of liability contained in the Athens Convention or FU Regulation 392/2009 for death/ personal injury of 46,666 Special Drawing Rights (SDR) or 300,000 SDR under Athens Convention or 400,000 SDRs under EU Regulation 392/2009 except in the case of liability for war or terrorism 250,000 SDRs. We are not liable for valuables, monies or other securities including jewellery and watches. If they have been deposited with the reception desk on the ship for safe keeping and a receipt issued then in those limited circumstances the Carriers liability will be as set out in the Athens Convention or EU Regulation 392/2009. The use of safes on board a Vessel is not a deposit with the ship or with the company under the Athens Convention or EU Regulation 392/2009 or otherwise. The limits are 1200 SDRs pursuant to Athens or 3,375 SDRs pursuant to EU Regulation 392/2009.

(vii) Where there is any loss of or damage to property including luggage which is not covered by any international convention and where liability is not limited by reference to any enactment, terms of conditions, then any legal liability that we may have for any such losses or damage will not exceed £500 per guest.

(viii) You must provide ourselves and our insurers with all assistance we may reasonably require. You must also tell us and the supplier concerned about your claim or complaint as set out in clause 11 above. If asked to do so, you must transfer to us or our insurers any rights you have against the supplier or whoever else is responsible for your claim or complaint (if the person concerned is under 18, their parent or guardian must do so). You must also agree to cooperate fully with us and our insurers if we or our insurers want to enforce any rights which are transferred.

(ix) Please note, we cannot accept any liability for any damage, loss or expense or other sum(s) of any description: (a) which on the basis of the information given to us by you concerning your booking prior to our accepting it, we could not have foreseen you would suffer or incur if we breached our contract with you; or (b) relate to any business.

(x) We will not accept responsibility for services or facilities which do not form part of our agreement or where they are not advertised in our brochure. For example any excursion you book whilst away, or any service or facility which your hotel or any other supplier agrees to provide for you.

14. YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES AND

When you book arrangements with us you accept responsibility for the proper conduct of yourself and your party. If your actions or omissions cause damage to any property in the provision of the contracted arrangements, or cause delay or diversion to any flight or other means of transportation, you agree to fully indemnify us against any claim (including professional fees and legal costs) made against us by or on behalf of the owner of such property or the operator of the flight or other means of transportation. The Captain of an aircraft or Master of a ship has authority over the aircraft/ship and passengers at all times when they are boarding or on board. There will be no liability on our part, or that of any supplier, for any refund, compensation, or costs thus incurred. Additionally, we will have the right to recover full costs resulting from the incident from the passenger

At any port or place we may refuse to embark or may disembark any passenger who, in the opinion of the ship's authorized personnel, might be excluded from landing at further destinations by local authorities or who may be suffering from any contagious or infectious disease, or whose presence may be detrimental to the wellbeing of passengers or crew. In cases of quarantine of the ship, or individual passengers (passengers may be required to remain in their cabin or as instructed by authorised personnel on board if they or any other occupant of the accommodation presents any symptoms or may be considered to put other passengers at risk) we will not be liable for expenses thus caused and in such cases as above there will be no entitlement to any refund or compensation and we will have no liability for costs incurred as a result.

Your specific passport and visa and health requirements and other immigration requirements are your responsibility and you should confirm these with the relevant Embassies and/or Consulates. We do not accept responsibility if you cannot travel because you have not complied with the latest requirements. If you have made independent travel arrangements you accept responsibility for joining the ship in good time, regardless of any change to the sailing time or date, or to the itinerary. We are not able to refund monies paid to us, or any third party acting on our or your behalf, or make compensation or other payments where, for whatever reason, you fail to join the ship. Passengers going ashore are responsible for re-boarding the ship prior to departure from port.

We reserve the right to substitute another vessel for the scheduled

vessel whether or not owned or operated by Hurtigruten. Any part of the travel arrangements and the voyage is subject to cancellation, delay, modification, or island/ mainland visit cancellation for any reason, including medical disembarkation of crew or passengers or any other circumstances beyond our or our suppliers' control. You therefore acknowledge and agree that the scheduled itinerary for the voyage and the announced departure and arrival times are not guaranteed and we shall not be liable to passengers for any damages or other claims in the event of any delay, changes in itinerary or inability to perform services by reason of any event or events beyond our or our suppliers' control.

15. INSURANCE

It is a condition of the contract with us that every member of the booking has travel insurance in force for the entire duration of the booking, covering at least the cancellation of the booking and providing medical cover for illness or injury and repatriation while overseas. Please provide us with the name of your insurer, together with their 24-hour emergency number when you book or as soon as possible.

16. TIMINGS, DELAYS & OTHER TRAVEL INFORMATION

Timings are estimates only and cannot be guaranteed, even if shown on tickets. They may be changed due to regulatory authority requirements, weather conditions, maintenance or technical reasons, and the ability of passengers to check in and board on time. Sometimes delays cannot be avoided but in such situations, in conjunction with our local agents or representatives, we will try to ensure your comfort during the course of any delay.

Where the port of embarkation is in the EU and the company reasonably expects the departure of a cruise to be delayed for more than 90 minutes beyond its scheduled departure time, passengers departing from port terminal shall be offered free of charge snacks, meals or refreshments as are appropriate given the waiting time, provided they are available and can reasonably be supplied. If the delay in departure necessitates a stay of one or more nights or a stay additional to that intended by the passenger where and when physically possible the Company shall, subject to the Package Travel Regulations 1992 and the EU Directive 2015/2302 on Package Travel (and subsequent UK regulations, offer passengers departing from port terminals free of charge adequate accommodation on board or ashore, and transport to and from the port terminal and place of accommodation in addition to the snacks, meals and refreshments previously referred to. The maximum amount that the

company will pay for accommodation ashore and transport to and from the port terminal shall be equivalent to 80 Euros per person per night for a maximum of three nights. The company will not have an obligation to provide such accommodation ashore where the delay is caused by weather conditions endangering the safe operation of the ship.

Please note the existence of a "Community list" (available for inspection at https://ec.europa.eu/ transport/modes/air/safety/airban_en) detailing air carriers that are subject to an operating ban with the EU Community.

17. PROMPT ASSISTANCE

If the contract we have with you is not performed or is improperly performed as a result of failures attributable to you or a third party unconnected with the provision of the arrangements, or as a result of failures due to unusual and extraordinary circumstances, and you suffer an injury or other material loss, we will offer you such prompt assistance as is appropriate in the circumstances. In particular, we will provide you with appropriate information on health services, local authorities and consular assistance, and with distance communications and finding alternative travel arrangements. Where you experience a delay which is not owing to any failure by us, our employees or subcontractors, this prompt assistance is likely to extend to providing help in locating refreshments, accommodation and communications but not paying for them. Any airline or other transport supplier may however pay for or provide refreshments and/or appropriate accommodation and you should make a claim directly to them. Subject to the other terms of these conditions, we will not be liable for any costs, fees or charges you incur in the above circumstances, if you fail to obtain our prior authorisation before making your own travel arrangements.

18. VALIDITY OF TERMS AND CONDITIONS

These terms and conditions are valid from July 2023 and the details and prices may be superseded. Changes may occur after the date of release, and some hotel/ship facilities may become unavailable. While this brochure features photography and descriptions of local wildlife, there is no quarantee of sightings

19. LAW AND JURISDICTION

Your contract shall be governed by English law and the jurisdiction of the English Courts. You may however choose the law and jurisdiction of Scotland or Northern Ireland if you wish to do so.

20. DATA PROTECTION

In order to process your booking and ensure your travel arrangements run smoothly and meet your requirements we, Hurtigruten Ltd, need to use the information you provide such as name, address, any special needs/ dietary requirements etc. We take full responsibility for ensuring that proper security measures are in place to protect your information. We must pass the information on to the relevant suppliers of your travel arrangements such as airlines, ships, hotels, transport companies etc. The information may also be provided to security or credit checking companies, public authorities such as customs/ immigration if required by them, or as required by law.

Additionally, where your holiday is outside the European Economic Area (EEA), controls on data protection in your destination may not be as strong as the legal requirements in this country. We will not pass any information on to any person not responsible for part of your travel arrangements. This applies to any sensitive information that you give to us such as details of any disabilities, or dietary/religious requirements. (If we cannot pass this information to the relevant suppliers, whether in the EEA or not, we cannot provide your booking. In making this booking, you consent to this information being passed on to the relevant persons.) Please note that where information is also held by your travel agent, this is subject to your agent's own data protection policy. Hurtigruten is not responsible for the privacy practices of any other companies.

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
